President's Message

I've received four inquiries recently on the coming close approach of Mars. What close approach? Right now, Mars is about as far away from Earth as it gets! Why the sudden buzz? It seems that email from last year and three years ago (when Mars truly was very close, but still no closer than 35 million miles away) are now circulating like some recurring viral disease. The old emails are modified to current dates, but the same hoax message about Mars appearing as large as the full Moon survives. Different forms of the email have Mercury or Venus as the planet approaching incredibly close to Earth in a once-in-a-lifetime event. Since your friends and relatives likely know of your interest in Astronomy, be armed with the knowledge that the email message is a hoax and the next close approach of Mars (opposition) will be in late December, 2007. And it will not be a particularly close opposition at about 55 million miles.

For a truly interesting planetary view, try locating Uranus in Aquarius over the next month. It's near Lambda (λ) Aquarii and moves into opposition September 4 reaching magnitude 5.7 (about the same as Mars currently is). Uranus is a beautiful blue-green planet that few amateur observers seek out – make it

an observing goal of yours this fall.


Back here on Earth, I'm very happy to report that great progress was made on the planetarium improvements. VBAS members and volunteers complete painting the walls in late July. Special thanks go to Boy Scout Troop 142, who helped paint on July 29th. After the paint was dry, new carpet was laid in early August. All the improvements to the Planetarium, the roof, painting, and carpet, have been funded through the NASA grant originally awarded in May of 2005, then amended in September 2005. The work planned for this summer

is now complete and the planetarium looks great. Come to the members meeting on August 18 and see for yourself!

The planetarium is now ready to be reopened for regular public shows and school programs. To celebrate the improvements, we've scheduled a combined Astronomy Day and Grand Reopening for September 30. Regular Monthly Meeting: Cosmology and the Hubble Constant

Cosmology is the scientific study of the large scale properties of the Universe as a whole, and it endeavors to use scientific methods to understand the origin, evolution, and ultimate fate of the entire Universe. Part of this study involves observational testing of the Big Bang theory, which attempts to explain the expansion of the Universe using a Cosmological Constant and the Hubble Law.

We're excited to have Massimiliano Bonamente, Assistant Research Professor at UAH's Physics Department and NSSTC, as our guest speaker for this month's Members' Meeting. He will be speaking about the history of the Hubble constant, and his recent involvement in NASA's project using the Chandra X-ray Observatory to independently determine the expansion rate of the Universe, the so-called Hubble constant.

The Night Sky for August, 2006

Here is the view at 9 PM in mid August, 2006, at 34° N Latitude, 86° W Longitude. Mars, the shield-and-spear symbol, will be near Leo. Jupiter, the curly "4" symbol, will be big and bright between Libra and Virgo.

The best meteor show of most years is the Perseid shower peaking on August 12, which is just after full moon this year. This meteor stream is debris from the comet Swift-Tuttle, and the radiant (Perseus) rises not long after dark. Meteors from this shower should be prominent from August 7 'til August 17 even though the sharp peak will be spoiled by the full moon this year.

He/they will be returning on August 12th to finish the beds up and do some painting and patch work on the walls.




Dr. William Keel's Tour
