Public Programs for September

Our member's meeting was held on Friday, September 15, and the minutes will appear in the October *Via Stellaris*. In September, Dr. Phil Stahl, from NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, gave a special presentation on the James Webb Space Telescope.

At our next Member's Meeting on Friday, October 20th at 7:30 pm, Walt Langley will present a program on "Hallo Northern Sky", a free planetarium software package for Microsoft Windows capable of controlling "go-to" telescopes, and utilizing the SAO, PPM, and Tycho-2 Star databases.

Walt will have his laptop setup along with his telescope to show us how easy it is to use as well as the sophisticated graphics and database algorithms. It comes with over 26000 deep sky objects and all stars to magnitude 12!

Remember to invite your friends and join us at VBAS for the 7:30 Members' Meeting followed by viewing of the night sky afterwards. VBAS Member Meetings are held on the 3rd Friday of each month at 7:30 p.m.; they're open to the public and are free.

Our facilities remodeling is complete and lookin' great, so planetarium programs will officially resume after our Astronomy Day Grand Reopening on September 30. Planetarium programs start at 7:30 PM. Admission to planetarium shows is free for VBAS Members, \$3.00 for Adults, \$2.00 for Children 6-11, and free for children under 6. Observation of the night sky through various telescopes normally follows each planetarium program, weather permitting.

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President's Message



I suppose I should say something about Pluto – everyone from Stephen Hawking to Jay Leno has had something to say about its expulsion from the club of planets. Is it a wise decision? I think so. Pluto has always been the

odd planet out. It's usually the ninth planet from the Sun, but sometimes the eighth. Its orbit is inclined significantly from the equatorial plane of the Sun, making it different from the other eight. Surely its formation was due to different forces than those forming the other planets. Because it's so different and because it now seems to be more akin to even further distant objects orbiting the Sun, the decision seems to be sound. But it's going to take some time to get used to saying "the eight planets and the three or four dwarf planets". In the end, the "demotion" doesn't mean very much. Pluto is unchanged by the classification system of humans on Earth. It is what it is and our naming system doesn't change that. And I want the inhabitants of Pluto to know that we don't think any less of them at all just because they live on a dwarf planet!

The Night Sky for September, 2006


Here is the view at 9 PM in mid September, 2006, at 34° N Latitude, 86° W Longitude. Uranus, the circle-and-arrow symbol, will be near Aquarius. Neptune, the trident symbol, will be visible by telescope in Capricorn. Pluto will be between Sagittarius and Ophiuchus. Uranus and Neptune are easily visible by telescope, Pluto not so easily.

According to the International Meteor Organization's 2006 Meteor Shower Calendar, at <http://www.imo.net/calendar/2006>, there are three meteor showers coming up in the next few months. On Oct 21, the Orionids meteor shower will peak during a new moon, and the Zodiacal light will be visible in the East just before twilight. On Nov 19th, the Leonids will peak during a new moon. On

Dec 14, the Geminids will peak during a waning crescent moon.

To catch the peak, watch during the early morning hours of the day of the peak. For example, watch the Orionids from midnight Oct 20 until 5 am on the 21st. This is when your location on Earth is facing the direction the Earth is moving around the Sun. There will also be increased meteor activity during the days just before and after the peak. VBAS Draft Member Meeting Minutes

VBAS Planetarium, 7:30 PM on Friday August 18, 2006

President Jeff Delmas introduced the meeting, and asked our guests to raise their hands.

Membership secretary Linda Farnell announced that James Brefford, and James and Mary Francis Hales, are new members.

As nominating committee chairman, Steve Sloan announced that we appointed Eric Peterson as our new Director of Administration. That fills our last open board position.

Treasurer Gena Crook gave a brief Treasurer's Report [See below]. She highlighted two school bus payments, and expenditures for new carpet in the planetarium.

Jeff Delmas briefly described Skylar Call's facilities improvements. [See page 5]

Wesley Swift announced that we need to be organizing an Observatory Committee meeting soon.

Doug Horacek asked about whether he was approved for his committee, because parts of the Bylaws suggest that committee members must be approved by the board. This sparked a discussion of the Bylaws. The consensus was that committee members do not need to be approved. We will accept any willing member to any committee.

Wesley Swift is looking for people to help with lunar meteorite impact observations. The program needs amateur help to have as many eyes out there as possible, because only seven impacts have been observed so far. The program wants to do computerized analysis of amateurs' observations of the Moon, so they can find additional impacts. Wes attempted to do something similar for the Perseids, but the peak of the shower was unobservable.

Other Committee Reports:

Melissa Snider talked about

Astronomy Day, which is scheduled for Saturday, September 30. We have found an astronomer, Timothy Dowling, to speak about Jupiter. He will come down on the 29th, then speak on Saturday evening. He didn't want money for his appearance. Astronomy Day will run from 9 AM to 1 PM in the afternoon, then run from 7 PM to whenever that evening.

Astronomy Day planning and preparation are well underway. We have subcommittees appointed, including Children's Programming, Merchandise, and Publicity. There is a draft flyer out, which Melissa asked the members to distribute.

There are several things we'll need from the members. We still need volunteers. We are looking for in-kind donations of prizes. If members have tents, we would like to borrow them. We need snack packs, juice boxes, and other similar items donated, along with cash for rocket launches.

A-Day setup starts at 7 am on September 30, then there will be an additional shift at 10 AM. Someone will be locking the planetarium at 11 PM. There are copies of the A-Day budget available, which the board needs to approve.
