

Public Programs for March

Our next member's meeting will be held on Friday, March 16th at 7:30 pm. VBAS Member Meetings are held on the 3rd Friday of each month at 7:30 p.m.; they're open to the public and are free. Dr. Rob Suggs of NASA's Meteoroid Environment Office will describe the lunar impact monitoring program at Marshall Space Flight Center. Using 2 computer-controlled 14 inch telescopes, Rob's team has been recording the dark portion of the moon for the past year, and has detected over 35 probable meteoroid impact flashes. Rob will describe the observational program, the data analysis, and preliminary results from these observations. He will also discuss the hypervelocity impact test program which will enable development of an improved engineering model of the meteoroid ejecta environment needed for design of lunar landers and EVA systems for the Constellation Program. Dr. Bill Cooke will be presenting a planetarium program on Pluto on March 10, Mitzi Adams will present her Easter show on the 24th, and Gena Crook will give a children's show on observing the Moon on the 31st. Planetarium programs start at 7:30 PM. Admission to planetarium shows is free for VBAS Members, \$3.00 for Adults, \$2.00 for Children 6-11, and free for children under 6. Observation of the night sky through various telescopes normally follows each planetarium program, weather permitting.

is a great opportunity for newer observers to learn more about the night sky, and to learn observing techniques from more experienced members. I am one of the original founding members of the VBAS (originally the RCAA, Rocket City Astronomical Association). As a Life Member, I am happy to have been on the mailing (or email) list for many years, but I am sorry that it has been a long time since I was active or even attended a meeting.

A couple of recent items attracted my interest; the renewal of the agreement on the land, and the "50th Anniversary".

The 50th anniversary was about two years ago because the organization was started in late 1954 or early 1955. I don't have exact dates, because I prudently destroyed all of my older diaries prior to my marriage in November 1955. I can reconstruct some dates from old checks and clippings. I came to Huntsville in 1951 to join the Von Braun Rocket Team; I was 20 years old and fresh out of Auburn.

In late 1954 or early 1955, a Huntsville High School student, whose name I have forgotten, proposed to his parents that he would like to start an astronomy club. He was put in touch with several adult scientists, including Conrad Swanson, Ernst Stuhlinger and Wernher von Braun. Somebody invited me to the initial meeting at a private home a little east of California Street. We formed the "Rocket City Astronomical Association". Now all we needed was a telescope and an observatory. Von Braun had scheduled a business trip to the Los Angeles area soon, and he offered to look for a telescope. When he returned, he told us he had visited Mt. Wilson and made inquiries. By then he was famous enough to be welcomed in such places. They had referred him to an instrument maker in Pasadena, whom he visited. The man had an observatory in his back yard, which included a reflecting telescope of his own manufacture. It had a sixteen and half-inch mirror. He wanted to replace it, and he offered the optics for \$700. Von Braun brought the offer to our next meeting. We had no dues and no treasury yet. I stood up and offered \$100, if we could find the other \$600. Before the evening was over, six others, including Von Braun, had furnished the sum. That was March 2, 1955; my check No. 525 to "Sam Pruitt, Treasurer, RCAA" was dated March 6, 1955. (\$100 was a lot of money at that time; my gross income before taxes and deductions

was around \$500 per month, but I was not married nor expecting to be married in early 1955.)

We began to meet regularly, and formed an actual incorporated organization with a constitution and bylaws. We began to solicit donation of materials and funds. Wilhelm Angele had joined us early-on, and he presented us with three alternative observatory design concepts. The simplest was a sort of lean-to, which Von Braun referred to as "an out-house", which led us to vote for the most elaborate, which still stands. Now we must find a high-altitude site. My hobbies included a collection of topographic maps of our area. (At that time I had no idea that twenty years later I would earn a Ph.D. in Geography.) Dr. Stuhlinger and I studied them, looking for mountains that were not populated. (He had my maps on the back seat of his car when the Army M.P.'s stopped him and confiscated the maps because they showed Redstone Arsenal. This required a visit to the Provost Marshall to explain that these were USGS maps available to the public for 15 cents each.) Dr Stuhlinger rented a Piper Cub at the airport and he piloted it while we looked for our site. Most of the peaks were privately owned, as a trip to the Court House proved, but two were owned by the AffaebyaontantState park Service. I volunteered to explore possibilities with the state. I mentioned the problem in a letter to my parents in Montgomery County.

Dad always made a habit of being acquainted with each governor, so, without my prior knowledge (he had no telephone), he simply visited Governor James E. (Big Jim) Folsom in his office in the capitol. He explained that his "rocket-scientist" son and associates needed a mountain site. Big Jim picked up his phone and called the Director of State Parks. He told him to expect a visit from me and "...to give him anything he needs." Dad wrote me with this news.

By this time, probably Spring of 1955, I was interested in a young woman in Montgomery, so I decided to combine a visit with my parents, a date with the girl, and an appointment with the official. My appointment was with immr. Sie

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that our first choice, Inspiration Point, was in litigation. I chose the other site, which was larger and located in Monte Sano State Park. The terms I recall included a lease for \$1.00 per 99 years. Dr. Stuhlinger and I went to the site with the park manager and placed stakes around the site and a proposed access road. I do not recall how the deal was formalized. My memory may be fogged because later that year I proposed to and married that Montgomery lady. Our wedding was November 12, 1955, so I know all this happened before that date (which I must never forget!).

At one of the early meetings, which were then being held in a classroom at Huntsville High School, there was an unpleasant event. We were getting good response from the community in terms of money and building material donations. Mr. Angele brought a man to the meeting who proposed to make large donations. However, his proposal was contingent upon our amending our constitution and bylaws to specifically bar membership to Negroes. This shocked everybody. Someone commented that such a thing would be illegal. The man seemed surprised by our reluctance, so he loudly proclaimed that his support would be withdrawn unless there was a motion to exclude blacks. There was a moment of stunned silence until I said, "I move that we bar this man from membership". There were seconds from throughout the room and RCAA Chairman, Von

Braun, laughed and accepted my motion. By then the man's face was as red as his neck, and he quickly gathered up his papers and left the meeting with some ugly departing words. After the meeting, Mr. Angele told me I might have been more diplomatic, because the proposed donations were quite large. I told him that we must not tolerate such intolerance. We had no black members at that time, but with two colleges here we must not exclude them. Maybe old meeting minutes include this exchange, but since we never voted on my motion, it may have been excluded.

I was happy to have put in some physical labor on the observatory, instruments, and planetarium. I had not had access to a telescope since I built my own three-inch refractor around 1943 when I was about 12 years old. I first became interested in astronomy when I was in the third grade, 1938-39. My interest in rockets also goes back to that time. I built my first rockets around 1940; it is a wonder I didn't blow my hand off. That is another story.


